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Herman Hollerith (1860-1929) Inventor of punch card tabulation system. The son of German immigrants, Herman Hollerith was born in Buffalo, New York on February 29, 1860. After graduating from Columbia University School of Mines in 1879, Hollerith worked for the Census Bureau as a special agent on the 1880 census, which prompted him to invent and perfect a useable system for automatically tabulating statistics using holes punched in paper. This system was the foundation upon which today's data processing industry is based. The Bureau rented Hollerith's tabulating machine system for the 1890 census. Hollerith had worked for the Census Bureau from 1879-1882, after which he left to become an instructor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He left MIT after a year to first work in St. Louis, where his electrically controlled railroad brakes competed with, but lost to, George Westinghouse. Hollerith then returned to Washington, D.C. as an Assistant Examiner in the United States Patent Office. After a year at the Patent Office, Hollerith struck out on his own as an "Expert and Solicitor of Patents."¹ His primary occupation after 1890, however, remained tied to developing and marketing his tabulation machines, and winning contracts to compute census statistics for foreign countries. In 1896, he incorporated his business as the Tabulating Machine Company, and commercial application of his machines in the United States further heightened his success. The 1900s proved an exhausting and frustrating decade for Hollerith, and doctors' concerns about his health and temperament encouraged him to sell the Tabulating

According to an interview with Virginia Hollerith and Nan Hollerith, their father worked at the Patent Office at the same time as his future mother-in-law, Theodosia Barnard Talcott. Talcott worked at the Patent Office as either a clerk or a copyist from 1869 to 1899, after which she is no longer listed as an employee. At this time, she married T. Edward Hambleton and left Washington, D.C. Theodosia was one of the first female career employees at the Patent Office, and Geoffrey Austrian claims that her income kept her family, and that of her son-in-law, financially solvent during Hollerith's down periods.

Machine Company to Charles Flint in a merger in 1911. Hollerith received over one million dollars for his shares, some of which he reinvested in the new company, the Computing-Tabulating-Recording Company (C-T-R). He continued with C-T-R in various consulting roles until 1921. In 1924, C-T-R renamed the International Business Machines Corporation (IBM). Hollerith died at home of heart failure November 17, 1929, and is buried at Oak Hill Cemetery in Georgetown.

On September 15, 1890, Hollerith married Lucia Beverly Talcott of Washington, D.C., with whom he later fathered six children. During the early stages of his career as a businessman, his precarious personal finances encouraged him to move his family in with his mother-in-law, Theodosia Talcott Hambleton, the daughter of Robert Barnard of Georgetown's "Normanstone." During the 1910s, the Holleriths built and moved to 1617 29th Street NW (Georgetown). The property also included Mackall House at 1633 29th Street, NW.

Lucia Beverly (Talcott) Hollerith (1865-1944), the daughter of Charles G. Talcott and Theodosia Barnard Talcott Hambleton. She was born in Mexico while her father, a civil engineer, worked on railroad construction between Vera Cruz and Mexico City. Her paternal grandfather, Andrew Talcott of Virginia (1797-1883) was also a civil engineer and supervised the Mexican railroad project. Her maternal grandfather was Robert Barnard (1786-1852), master of "Normanstone" in Georgetown (now the site of the British embassy). On her father's side, Mrs. Hollerith descended from several prominent Virginia families, including the Randolphs of Tuckahoe. Lucia Talcott married "statistical engineer" Herman Hollerith on September 15, 1890, with whom she later had six children.² Following the death of her husband in 1929, Mrs. Hollerith remained with her three daughters in the family home in Georgetown, and summered at "Brighton," their estate in Mathews County, Virginia. According to her daughters, Mrs. Hollerith played an instrumental role in founding the Georgetown Garden Club in 1924.³ Lucia Hollerith died at "Brighton" on August 4, 1944, and is buried in the Hollerith family plot in Oak Hill Cemetery in Georgetown.

For ease of identification, Mrs. Lucia Hollerith is referred to in this register as "Mrs. Hollerith" or "Lucia Talcott Hollerith" to distinguish her from her daughter, also named Lucia Hollerith.

None of the Hollerith daughters ever married. After the death of their mother, Lucia, Nannie and Virginia Hollerith continued to live in the family's Georgetown home, and summer at "Brighton" in Mathews County, Virginia. Until the late 1960s, they also operated a Guernsey farm, called "Mobjack Farm," which was an integral part of the "Brighton" property.

Lucia Beverly Hollerith (1891-1982). The eldest child of Herman and Lucia Hollerith. She attended the National Cathedral School for Girls and the Corcoran School of Art. Lucia was an artist, taught flower arranging at the National Cathedral School, and was also active at Christ Church in Georgetown. From the mid-1970s to the time of her death of pneumonia in 1982, Lucia lived at the Fernwood House in Bethesda. Documents in the Hollerith family papers suggest that her mental capacity had diminished considerably by that time. Lucia is buried with her sisters, Nannie and Virginia, in the Hollerith family plot in Oak Hill Cemetery in Georgetown.

Nannie Talcott Hollerith (1898-1985) Although legally “Nannie,” Miss Hollerith preferred to be called Nan. She contributed to a number of charitable organizations, and was a member of the Republican Party. Like her sisters, she belonged to Christ Church in Georgetown, and supported the National Cathedral, and had a keen interest in horticulture. Her diaries suggest that she enjoyed attending movies, lectures, and other cultural events. Nan seems to have also been responsible for much of the housekeeping chores.

Virginia Hollerith (1902-1994) The youngest child of Herman and Lucia Hollerith. Virginia seems to have enjoyed photography, gardening, and shopping.

Other Hollerith children include: **Herman Hollerith, Jr.** (1892-1976), **Charles Hollerith** (1893-1972), and **Richard Hollerith** (1900-1967). All the Hollerith sons entered engineering as a profession. Although mentioned in the collection’s documents, most of the material relates to the Hollerith women.

Scope and Content: The Hollerith Family Papers, 1880-1986 holds particular appeal for students of women’s history and historic preservation. Personal and business-related materials belonging to Mrs. Herman Hollerith and her three daughters document the activities and interests of two generations of Washington, D.C. women. The collection especially highlights the business concerns, shopping habits, charitable associations, and daily lives of the Misses Hollerith. The diaries and receipts maintained by Mrs. Hollerith and her daughters suggest the ways in which the Hollerith women spent their free time and money, while the ladies’ legal and financial papers reflect their active interest in the management of their sizable estates. Business documents record their holdings in stocks and bonds, real estate investments, and operation of their farm in Mathews County, Virginia. Real estate records document the process of transferring their Georgetown property to an historic preservation easement, while bills and receipts relating to the contents of their residence and repair work to the structure itself make the collection a valuable resource for reconstructing the architectural and interior design history of prominent Georgetown homes.

This collection is arranged in ten series:

SERIES I, GENEALOGICAL AND BIOGRAPHICAL MATERIAL, contains a few notes on families related to the Holleriths. Documents throughout the collection, especially legal and financial

papers, shed additional light on members of the Hollerith family, as does the genealogical material in the Robert Barnard Family Papers, 1658-1917 (MS 541).

SERIES II, HERMAN HOLLERITH PAPERS, ca. 1894-1944, includes some documents which predate Herman Hollerith's death in 1929, but much of this series reflects Mr. Hollerith's financial holdings and the settlement of his estate.

SERIES III, LUCIA B. TALCOTT HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1880-1960. The series is divided into sub-series which contain the personal correspondence and financial records maintained by Mrs. Hollerith:

Sub-Series A, Lucia B. Talcott Hollerith Personal Papers, 1880-1944, features letters written to Mrs. Hollerith by friends and family members, her 1935 passport, and assorted documents relating to horticulture and the Georgetown Garden Club. Materials are generally arranged chronologically, although correspondence appears at the beginning of the sub-series. Mrs. Hollerith also kept diaries, which are located in Series IX.

Sub-Series B, Lucia B. Talcott Hollerith Financial Records, 1911-1960, relate to stock transactions, the estates of Herman Hollerith and Lucia Talcott Hollerith, purchases made, insurance statements, tax records, and account books. Materials are generally arranged chronologically, although correspondence precedes account books and tax records.

SERIES IV, LUCIA B. HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1916-1984, contains an account book and correspondence written to, about, or from Lucia Hollerith. The series also includes a copy of Lucia Hollerith's 1982 death certificate and documents relating to the settlement of her estate. Materials are arranged chronologically. Lucia Hollerith also kept diaries, which are located in Series IX.

SERIES V, NANNIE T. HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1917-1985, includes several financial account books, bills and receipts, correspondence related to stock transactions, assorted letters, general business correspondence, tax records, records of memberships and charitable donations, and wills and materials relating to the settlement of Miss Hollerith's estate following her death in 1985. Materials are arranged by type of record and then chronologically by the earliest document contained in each folder. Nannie Hollerith also kept diaries, which are located in Series IX.

SERIES VI, VIRGINIA HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1914-1986, contain a small diary (comprised mainly of lists and measurements), financial correspondence, records relating to stock transactions, and memberships and charitable donations. Materials are arranged by type of record and then chronologically by the earliest document contained in each folder. This series includes records of donations made by the Hollerith family, with correspondence addressed to Virginia Hollerith. The donations encompassed gifts of various items and papers to the Westmoreland Davis Memorial Foundation, Gelman Library at George Washington University, and the Library of Congress.

SERIES VII, THE MISSES HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1917-1985, features bills and receipts, legal and other correspondence, and employee records maintained by the Misses Hollerith as a unit, or not

addressed to a specific Miss Hollerith. For the purpose of paying bills, the Misses Hollerith often maintained accounts in the name of one sister when in fact all three utilized the account. Materials are arranged by type of record and then chronologically by the earliest document contained in each folder.

SERIES VIII, REAL ESTATE RECORDS, 1913-1985, contains records relating to the management of the Hollerith home at 1617 29th Street, NW, as well as numerous other rental properties owned by the Holleriths in the District of Columbia and the State of Maryland. Records relating to the management of the Holleriths' farm in Mathews County, Virginia are also included in this series. Documents for 1617 29th Street are mainly bills and receipts for products installed in and work completed on the home, although Folders 78-80 detail the institution of a preservation easement encompassing the Mackall Square property. Rental property records include bills and receipts for services rendered on the properties, account summaries provided by real estate management firms, and other correspondence regarding the properties. The end of the series contains real estate tax and government bills involving Hollerith properties, as well as utility bills incurred at residential properties in Georgetown and Mathews County, Virginia. Property records are arranged individually by property, and therein chronologically. Tax and utility bills arranged by type of record, and therein chronologically.

SERIES IX, DIARIES, 1915-1975, contains diaries kept by Lucia Talcott Hollerith (1920-1944), Lucia Hollerith (1952-1969), and Nan Hollerith (1915-1975), as well as two volumes with unknown ownership. Most entries in all diaries record weather changes and recount daily activities.

SERIES X, OTHER PAPERS, 1892-1970s, includes account books, diaries and correspondence pertaining to other Hollerith family members; religious volumes; address books; and photographs. Arranged by type of record.

Herman Hollerith Papers, Prints and Photographs Division, Library of Congress. Includes a small collection of Hollerith photographs depicting family members and scenes from early 20th-

century Washington, D.C. Lot 11558 contains photographs of “Normanstone,” Lucia Hollerith’s maternal home, and several hand-drawn blueprints and proposals relating to its construction in 1830.

Oral History Interview with Miss Virginia Hollerith and Miss Nan Hollerith, Special Collections, Gelman Library, George Washington University. Reminiscences of Barnard, Talcott, and Hollerith family histories, and the Misses Hollerith’s recollections of life in Washington, D.C. in the early twentieth-century.

Talcott Family Papers, Virginia Historical Society, Richmond, Virginia. Papers relate to the history of the Talcott family, into which Theodosia Barnard married. Very little on the Barnard family is contained in this collection.

SERIES I: GENEALOGICAL AND BIOGRAPHICAL MATERIAL

Folder 1: Notes on Randolph and Jefferson family descendants, the Cromwell family, the Hollerith family, and inscription of Lawrence tomb in England. Documents of further genealogical interest are contained in other series in the collection, especially in the folders relating to establishing the Hollerith estate in Georgetown as a conservation easement. Other legal documents, such as wills and distribution of estate funds, contain information of a genealogical nature. See also Folder 1 of Barnard Family Papers, MS 541, Historical Society of Washington, D.C. The Holleriths traced their ancestry to the Barnard family through Lucia Talcott Hollerith, and some of the genealogies in this file either included Holleriths, or were prepared by Hollerith family members.

SERIES II: HERMAN HOLLERITH PAPERS, ca. 1894-1944

Folder 2: Assorted papers, ca. 1894-1927. Contains a pedigree chart for "Scott," a Scotch Staghound owned by Herman Hollerith, a photostatic copy of Herman Hollerith's 1925 will, statement of estimated income in 1927, statements regarding stocks and securities, and a letter from Morgan Beach to Col. C. B. Garnett carbon copied to Herman Hollerith, and a receipt from 1914. The majority of Herman Hollerith's papers can be found in the Manuscript Division of the Library of Congress.

Folder 3: Account ledger, 1910-1911. Records accounts with local merchants and individuals. Includes index at the front of volume. Many pages are blank.

Folder 4: Stock ledger, 1912-1913. Accounts reflect changes in stocks and loans. Includes index at the front of volume.

Folder 5: Statements of accounts, 1913-1922. Professionally prepared statements of accounts reflecting Hollerith's finances in terms of assets (real estate, loans, bonds, stocks, cash) and liabilities. Prepared by the Washington Loan and Trust Company.

Folder 6: Income tax records, 1914-1930. Contains returns, worksheets, and notes prepared for filing individual United States income tax returns, and correspondence relating to the filing of income tax. A few later tax stubs are for tax payments made to the District of Columbia.

Folder 7: "Notes Receivable Record, Estate of Herman Hollerith," 1924-1944. Details notes and bills held by Herman Hollerith, and accounting of notes until paid to Estate of Herman Hollerith. Although Hollerith died in 1929, accounting applies to notes dated from 1924.

Folder 8: Account book, undated. While this account book is undated, it dates from sometime prior to Hollerith's death in 1929. Pages 3-87 of this undated account book appears to have detailed bonds belonging to Herman Hollerith. A very similar ledger can be found in the papers of Hollerith's wife, Lucia. Beginning on page 89, the volume was used to record farm expenses from 1934-1936. Much of the last half of the volume is blank.

Folder 9: Legal records, estate of Herman Hollerith, 1929-1941. Includes a copy of Hollerith's will filed in 1929, audit report by Councilor & Buchanan, returns for federal estate tax, and depositions by administrators.

Folder 10: Stock transfers, estate of Herman Hollerith, 1929-Jan. 1931. Includes forms, information, and correspondence regarding process of transferring stock belonging to Herman Hollerith to his estate in the absence of an inheritance tax law in the District of Columbia. Much of the correspondence was between the Holleriths' attorney, Christopher Garnett, and the companies in which Herman Hollerith owned stock.

Folder 11: Stock transfers, estate of Herman Hollerith, Jan. 1931-1943. Correspondence documents the transfers of stock shares belonging to Herman Hollerith to his estate, and stock transactions on behalf of the Estate of Herman Hollerith.

SUB-SERIES A: LUCIA B. TALCOTT HOLLERITH PERSONAL PAPERS, 1880-1944

Folder 12: Cards, 1880 and undated. 2 items. Cloth and leather card case [?] with still-life birds on front, contained in envelope labeled "Miss Lucia B. Talcott, Care of G. W. Cropley, Cor. Bridge & Congress Sts., Georgetown, D. C." and postmarked 1880. Undated item contains pressed flowers in envelope addressed to Miss Lucia Talcott, thus predating her marriage to Herman Hollerith. Paper containing flowers bears note "These flowers were gathered, & arranged by Mr. Chas Talcott, Sr." (Lucia Talcott's father).

Folder 13: Gift notebook, 1904-1924. Records recipients of gifts (probably at Christmas) from Mrs. Hollerith and often what they received. All Hollerith children are listed, as is "Daddy," which appears in other writings in reference to Herman Hollerith. The scrawled initials "NTH" and pencil scribbling also suggest that Nannie Hollerith had access to volume as a child. Lists for 1920 and 1921 in back of book records things given to Mrs. Hollerith, while lists of recipients of Christmas cards span from 1920-24. Stitching on front of volume features the initials "LBH."

Folder 14: Personal correspondence, 1923-1932. Many letters written to Lucia Hollerith by friends, and some family members, especially George and Madeline Hollerith.⁴ Caroline Sutherland wrote a

series of letters in 1928 from the Highland Pines Inn in Southern Pines, North Carolina, in which she mentions activities with Nan Hollerith. Several letters in 1929 extend condolences to Mrs. Hollerith following the death of her husband. Activities of the Georgetown Garden Club are discussed in letters from 1930. Mrs. Hollerith's daughter Lucia sent numerous letters to her mother in 1932, while en route to and after her arrival in England to study art, and during her stay in Austria. Dr. Beverley R. Tucker of the Tucker Sanatorium in Richmond, Virginia, also a frequent correspondent, mentions in two letters his hope that a change in presidential leadership will improve financial conditions. A September 1932 carbon copy letter from Dr. Tucker reports on the health of Mrs. Hollerith's granddaughter, Lucia.

Folder 15: Personal correspondence, 1933-1944. A few letters from Lucia Hollerith to her mother. Further correspondence from Madeline Hollerith and Dr. Beverley Tucker. January 1934 letter of Henry Fletcher contains a scathing condemnation of the United States Congress in the wake of Franklin Roosevelt's election (a statement in memory of Fletcher is also in this file). A January 1934 letter from Mrs. Hollerith's cousin Mary Randolph details the latter's experiences as a domestic worker. A few letters relate to gardening activity. Erlo van Waveren letter of April 1935 discusses Mrs. Hollerith's travels through Holland. [See Folder 10 for Mrs. Hollerith's 1935 passport] A 1938 letter from Bertie Higgins informs Lucia Hollerith that their relative, Amelia Higgins, suffered a stroke (Amelia P. Higgins died in 1938). Jefferson Randolph Kean letter of 1939 contains material of genealogical interest about the Talcott family. Lucia Hollerith's brother E. M. Talcott's letter of November 1942 discusses the distribution of family heirlooms from the family home of "Normanstone," some of which appear to have been displayed in a museum. Talcott's letter also details their brother Harry's physical and mental condition. Many other letters written by Mrs. Hollerith's extended family, and friends.

Folder 16: Personal correspondence, undated. File contains undated letters written to Lucia B. Talcott Hollerith from friends and family members. Correspondents include Lucia Hollerith's daughters Lucia and Nan, Edmund and Grace Heard, Nellie Keohane, Mary Randolph, Bessie Kilpatrick, Florence McCandlish, and Rebecca Wellington.

Folder 17: Passport, 1935.

Folder 18: Certificate, garden writings, and undated notes. Certificate issued to Lucia B. Hollerith by the National Cathedral Builder in 1924. Certificate also could have been issued to Mrs. Hollerith's daughter Lucia, but likely belonged to the senior Lucia Hollerith. Garden writings contains a garden chart, but the majority of items are reports and observations on particular types of

Madeline, and Lucia Hollerith only began after Herman Hollerith's death in 1929. Once family connections had been reestablished, the George and Herman Holleriths wrote and visited one another fairly regularly.

plants. Most of the documents are undated, and appear to have been written or transcribed by Mrs. Hollerith. Undated notes include itinerary for trip on the S. S. Olympic and religious subjects.

Lucia B. Talcott Hollerith also kept diaries for the years 1920-1944, and have been arranged in Container 6 to facilitate storage. Please see "Series IX: Diaries" for descriptions.

SUB-SERIES A: LUCIA B. TALCOTT HOLLERITH FINANCIAL RECORDS, 1911-1960

Folder 19: Financial correspondence, 1911-1929. The majority of documents relate to stocks and bonds bought and sold by financial institutions on behalf of Lucia B. Hollerith, and Mrs. Hollerith's financial holdings. The file also contains a few receipts for purchases made prior to moving into home on 29th Street, NW; letter (addressed to Mr. and Mrs. Hollerith) to the Home Owners Committee of the Georgetown Citizens Association regarding zoning issues; assorted correspondence in 1929 related to the late Herman Hollerith's estate; handwritten statement of Union Trust Company account detailing charitable donations, rents, and life insurance. File also contains photocopies of the five pages of a 1926 account book in which Mrs. Hollerith recorded information regarding her bank accounts.

Folder 20: Financial correspondence, 1930-1933. File contains an account book for 1930 with a few pages of financial notations; continued correspondence regarding the estate of the late Herman Hollerith; loans to William Reynolds and other individuals; insurance statements; documents detailing stock transactions made on behalf of Mrs. Hollerith; estimation of tax bills; produce orders; receipt for the purchase of a Pierce-Arrow automobile; and correspondence on a variety of financial matters involving Lucia Hollerith.

Folder 21: Financial correspondence, 1934-1938. File contains insurance policy statements; inquiries about olive oil; grocery orders; statements relating to bank account deposits and stock transactions; estimation of tax bills; correspondence from Southern States Cooperative; notice of benefits paid to Lucia Hollerith as beneficiary of her brother Harry R. Talcott's estate; documents relating to loan to William Reynolds, and his plans to sell P Street property; affidavit in the matter of former employee Nellie Keohane.⁵

Folder 22: Financial correspondence, 1939-1945, and undated material. File contains insurance policy statements; assorted receipts, including the purchase of a Chevrolet automobile; correspondence from Southern States Cooperative; termination of service with Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Corp.; solicitation from W. H. Irwin Fleming, Architect; several documents relating to Hollerith properties; and undated correspondence sent to or from Mrs. Hollerith. Correspondence with the Office of Price Administration in 1943 rejects Mrs. Hollerith's request for a special ration of gasoline.

Folder 23: Account book, 1914-1922. Accounting of stocks, bonds, cash, and rents. Includes index at the front of volume.

Folder 24: Account book, 1914-1922. Chronological accounting of finances. Most of the book is blank.

Folder 25: Tax records, 1914-1931. Contains tax receipts from 1914, 1915; limited correspondence with Lucia B. Hollerith regarding taxation matters; duplicate income tax returns; prepared statements of income and tax liabilities; ledger entries and handwritten notes detailing financial transactions.

Folder 26: Account book, ca. 1914-1960. Records stock purchases, rates, and due dates. Lucia Hollerith appears to have written information recorded in ink, while penciled marks resemble handwriting of Nannie Hollerith. Pages 79-127 are not in Mrs. Hollerith's hand, and it is unclear if stocks were part of her estate, or bought by the Misses Hollerith.

Folder 27: Account book, 1926-1934. Primarily records dividend deposits from stocks and bonds, and expenses paid out from account. Summarizes activity of individual stocks and notes. Pages 94 to 101 relate to Liberty National Bank account but the rest of the volume is blank.

Folder 28: Account book, 1931-1941. Loose-leaf notebook paper recording transactions of stocks, bonds, and securities in terms of trading activity and dividends accrued. Includes yearly summaries of dividends, interest and deductions for years 1939-1941. A few pages record real estate rents and expenditures for rental property at 1743 Connecticut Avenue, and taxes and repair work for 1617 and 1633 29th Street, NW.

Folder 29: Tax records, 1933-1951, and undated material. Contains essentially the same type of documents as Folder 10, but includes more extensive correspondence with the District of Columbia regarding taxes due on Hollerith properties. As of 1944, income tax returns prepared for the estate of the late Lucia B. Hollerith.

Folder 30: Financial ledger, 1939-1943. Notebook recording transactions of stocks and United States Treasury Notes, and dividends accrued. Also includes a few pages which record real estate rents and expenditures, especially for 1743 Connecticut Avenue property.

Folder 31: Estate of Lucia B. Hollerith, 1944-1955. Contains correspondence to and from Nannie Hollerith, administratrix, with institutions and agencies involved in settling the estate of Lucia B. Hollerith. Authors and recipients of letters include Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles, Mills & Kilpatrick, the National Metropolitan Bank, Office of Register of Wills and Clerk of the Probate Court, and Scudder, Stevens & Clark. Also includes notes on the estate and real estate of Lucia B. Hollerith, and distribution of checks to Mrs. Hollerith's heirs.

SERIES IV: LUCIA B. HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1916-1984

Folder 32: Account book, 1916-1966. Entries chronologically track expenditures through 1932, but contains significant gap between 1932 and 1953. Beginning in 1953 accounting notes wages and expenses paid individuals, mainly for housekeeping duties.

Folder 33: Papers, 1940-1984. Contains correspondence written to, about, or from Lucia B. Hollerith. Earliest documents, apparently forwarded to Miss Hollerith relate to her niece's, Sally Hollerith, interest in attending Sweet Briar College in Virginia on a scholarship. As an heir to her uncle Harry R. Talcott's estate, Miss Hollerith was named a co-defendant in a suit filed in Florida, and sent a notice to appear in court. Other documents discuss matters of a financial nature. Small envelope contains notes on "name of Brighton china;" other envelope from "National Cathedral School Alumnae Association" lists Lucia B. Hollerith as treasurer. File also contains a copy of Miss Hollerith's 1982 death certificate, an inventory of her estate and heirs thereto, and documents sent to Virginia and Nannie Hollerith relating to Lucia Hollerith's estate.

Lucia B. Hollerith also kept diaries for the years 1952-1969, and have been arranged in Container 6 to facilitate storage. Please see "Series IX: Diaries" for descriptions.

SERIES V: NANNIE T. HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1917-1985

Folder 34: Notebooks, 1917-1922. Notebooks contain notes from school assignments; "Horses I Have Ridden," vol. II, 1917-22; and undated poetry.

Folder 35: Account book, 1918-1931. Ledger records individual stock dividends and other transactions, but also includes list of expenses Miss Hollerith owed her mother and 1931 record of account with Rebecca Wellington.

Folder 36: Account book, 1918-1933. Ledger records interest and dividends from individual stocks, and expenses paid out by Nannie Hollerith. Volume includes two loose-leaf papers relating to financial matters left in volume by Miss Hollerith.

Folder 37: Financial Ledger, 1919-1975. Records dividends and transactions for stocks and bonds bought and sold between 1919 and 1975. A few pages also track rent and some repairs on rental

properties, insurance values of buildings at Mobjack Farm, and bills and contributions paid in the 1970s.

Folder 38: Account book, 1922-1931. Small account book chronologically records payments made for goods and services. Accounts with individual women which note pounds and payment may refer to selling produce at farm in Mathews County, Virginia farm. Volume likely also used by Mrs. Lucia Hollerith as first few pages of church records are in her handwriting.

Folder 39: Tax records, 1924-1984. Contains correspondence to and from Miss Hollerith regarding the preparation of her tax returns, bills and receipts for personal and income taxes, notes made by Nan Hollerith as to her taxable income and other finances, copies of tax returns submitted to the District of Columbia and the Internal Revenue Service. Some of Miss Hollerith's notes detail the tax liabilities for herself, as well as her sisters. These pages are filed with Nannie Hollerith's records as the total information has more relevance to her finances. Arranged chronologically.

Folder 40: Bills and receipts, 1924-1984. File contains bills and receipts for personal goods and services bought by Nan Hollerith. Arranged alphabetically by name of company, then chronologically within company, when multiple documents are present. When collection contained multiples of similar receipts from the same business, only representative samples were retained. See appendix for alphabetical index of businesses represented.

Folder 41: Stocks and bonds, 1925-1968. Documents detail transactions of stocks and bonds made on behalf of Nan Hollerith. Most highlight the sale and purchase of individual shares, but others summarize Miss Hollerith's financial holdings. Most of this correspondence generated by investment counselors Scudder, Stevens & Clark of Philadelphia, and the Trust Department of the National Metropolitan Bank of Washington, D.C. The file also contains a few carbon copies of letters sent by Miss Hollerith to these institutions. Given the repetitive nature of this correspondence, only representative samples were retained. See Folder 38 for continuation of stocks and bonds records.

Folder 42: General business and financial correspondence, 1925-1981. Contains correspondence to and from Nannie Hollerith regarding financial matters. Subjects include insurance policy statements, orders for canned goods (one order includes labels from previous order), correspondence with from the Rural Electrification Administration, magazine subscriptions, requests for special gasoline rations sent to the Office of Price Administration, loans made by Nan Hollerith, estate of Lucy Bradley, social security benefits, 1969 automobile accident, authorization for sister Lucia to be taken for drives, and an Oral History Deed of Gift to Gelman Library at George Washington University. Documents primarily pertain to financial matters, but often contain personal subjects at the end of the letters. Mathews Insurance statements originally included the years 1955-79, but only representative sample statements retained.

Folder 43: Assorted letters and records, ca. 1929-1983, and not dated. File includes correspondence from Rebecca Wellington, Bessie Kilpatrick, and Samuel Fox; a thank you letter from Miss Hollerith's niece, Lucia Hollerith; driver's licenses issued to Nan Hollerith in 1934 by the District of Columbia and the State of Virginia; gardening matters and requests for speakers at Garden Club meetings; letter from uncle Edmund Talcott regarding property belonging to his brother Harry; letter from nephew Richard Hollerith; plans for the Garden Club; letter from nephew Herman Hollerith III ("Bud") enclosing copies of oyster planting rent for Virginia property; acknowledgment of help at Resurrection Chapel at the Washington [National] Cathedral.

Folder 44: Memberships and charitable donations, 1930-1984: A-E. Contains receipts and acknowledgments of membership to organizations to which Nan Hollerith belonged, and from charities to which she donated money. Arranged alphabetically by name of organization, then chronologically within organization, when multiple documents are present. When collection contained multiples of similar documents, only representative samples were retained.

Folder 45: Memberships and charitable donations, 1930-1984: F-W. Contains same types of documents as Folder 44.

Folder 46: Account book, 1932. Miss Hollerith's inscription on frontispiece dates the ledger to 1932, although the stock transactions summarized therein cover the years 1919-36. Ledgers list stocks alphabetically and records dates purchased and sold, and stock dividends. A few stocks carry the notation, "given by Daddy."

Folder 47: Account book, 1932-1934. Ledger chronologically records stock dividends. Only first thirty-one pages have been used; remainder of volume is blank.

Folder 48: Estate of Nannie T. Hollerith, 1945-1985. File contains multiple drafts of Nan Hollerith's wills and codicils of wills, powers of attorney, legal correspondence relating to Miss Hollerith's wills and the settlement of her estate; a copy of Nan Hollerith's June 1985 autopsy; and documents filed with the Probate Division of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia in settling the estate of Nan Hollerith. Copies of Ronald D. Aucutt's July 23, 1985 letter were also sent to Mrs. C. Aubrey Gasque, Mr. Charles Hollerith, Jr., Mr. Herman Hollerith III, Mr. Richard Hollerith, Jr., Mrs. Gillet Lefferts, Jr., and Mrs. H. Erich Nietsch.

Folder 49: Account book, 1946-1980. Financial notes compiled by Nannie Hollerith encompassing stocks, real estate, and charitable contributions

Folder 50: Stocks and bonds, 1969-1984. Continuation of content of Folder 41. Includes sales receipts for stocks and bonds bought and sold for Miss Hollerith by the Trust Department of American Security and Trust Company.

Nannie T. Hollerith also kept diaries for the years 1915-1975, and have been arranged in Containers 6 and 7 to facilitate storage. Please see "Series IX: Diaries" for descriptions.

SERIES VI: VIRGINIA HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1914-1986

Folder 51: Diary, 1914-1929. Small volume printed for the year 1889, but appears to have been used by Virginia Hollerith in 1910s and 1920s. Records a variety of measurements, including weather reports, Miss Hollerith's weight, and books she had read.

Folder 52: General business and financial correspondence, 1921-1985. Contains documents of a non-personal nature written to and by Virginia Hollerith. Includes a check written by Virginia Hollerith to Charles Hollerith; bills for tax preparation; donation of carriages and books to the Westmoreland Davis Memorial Foundation in Leesburg, Virginia; letters from Professor Owen Gingerich requesting an autograph of Herman Hollerith's; donation of books belonging to Robert Barnard to the Special Collections Division of the George Washington University Library, including an inventory of the books donated; Friends of the Libraries newsletters containing information about Hollerith donations and a certificate presented to Virginia Hollerith; transferal of oyster grounds owned by Herman Hollerith to Herman Hollerith III; oral history interview of Virginia and Nan Hollerith for Gelman Library at George Washington University; and a request from niece Nancy Lou Gasque for assistance in sending her son to law school. Many documents relate to the donation of the Herman Hollerith Papers and Photographs to the Library of Congress, including solicitation of the papers and deeds of gifts. The correspondence is addressed variously to Miss Lucia Hollerith and Miss Virginia Hollerith, but retained with Virginia Hollerith's correspondence for consistency.

Folder 53: Stocks and bonds, 1925-1984. Documents detail transactions of stocks and bonds made on behalf of Virginia Hollerith. Most highlight the sale and purchase of individual shares, but others summarize Miss Hollerith's financial holdings. Much of this correspondence generated by investment counselors Scudder, Stevens & Clark of Philadelphia, and the American Security and Trust Company of Washington, D.C. File also contains certificate for the Norfolk and Mobjack Bay Steamboat Company, of which one trustee was Herman Hollerith, and certificates for shares in the Investment Holding Corporation Original collection contained extensive correspondence during the 1960s-80s from Scudder, Stevens & Clark, Investment Counsel of Philadelphia, to Virginia Hollerith regarding her stock holdings and changes to her portfolio. Also included correspondence from American Security and Trust Company of Washington, D.C. and Virginia Hollerith regarding her accounts in association with stock portfolio. Given the repetitive nature of this correspondence, a sampling of documents were retained, especially those summarizing stock and bond transactions. Other documents record meetings between Virginia Hollerith and her investment counselors, bills for account management, and other financial matters.

Folder 54: Account book, 1933-1935. Chronologically records transactions involving stock dividends and her account National Metropolitan Bank. Volume is blank after page 35.

Folder 55: Combined Hollerith memberships and charitable donations, 1943-1986. Contains receipts and acknowledgments of membership to organizations to which Virginia Hollerith belonged to, and from charities to which she donated money. Arranged alphabetically by name of organization, then chronologically within organization, when multiple documents are present. When

collection contained multiples of similar documents, only representative samples were retained. See appendix for list of organizations. Reflecting the original organization of the documents, included in this file are memberships and donations addressed to Virginia Hollerith, the Miss Holleriths in general, or not addressed at all. Documents specifically addressed to Lucia Hollerith have been removed and filed with her papers.

SERIES VII: THE MISSES HOLLERITH PAPERS, 1917-1985

Folder 56: Bills and receipts, 1917-1984: A-C. Contains bills and receipts collected by the Misses Hollerith. Many receipts fail to specify who bought the items purchased, or alternatively list the holder of the account used by all three sisters. In the second case, several receipts show accounting done by Hollerith sisters to determine division of bills. Due to the repetitive nature of the collection, only representative samples were retained. See Appendix for alphabetical business listing. Organized alphabetically by name of the company, then chronologically when multiple receipts have been retained for single business.

Folder 57: Bills and receipts, 1917-1984: D-H.

Folder 58: Bills and receipts, 1917-1984: I-N.

Folder 59: Bills and receipts, 1917-1984: O-T.

Folder 60: Bills and receipts, 1917-1984: U-Z. Following the end of representative billing samples is a summary of the debts and credits each of the Misses Hollerith applied to their joint account for the years 1964-1967.

Folder 61: Medical bills and receipts, 1927-1984. The Misses Hollerith maintained an extensive collection of bills and receipts relating to medical services performed for them over the years. Only representative samples were retained for doctors and businesses patronized by the Holleriths. Materials in this file are organized alphabetically by the name of the doctor or business, and then chronologically when more than one sample was retained for a particular institution.

Folder 62: Bills and receipts [Mathews Co., Va.], 1931-1981. Contains bills and receipts from businesses in Mathews County and the surrounding area collected by the Misses Hollerith and other family members during their summers at "Brighton." Due to the repetitive nature of the collection, only representative samples were retained. See Appendix for alphabetical business listing. Documents organized alphabetically by name of the company, then chronologically when multiple receipts have been retained for single business. Researchers should also consult Folders 85-88, which contains records relating to Mobjack Farms.

Folder 63: Legal correspondence, 1945-1985. Folder contains correspondence written to the Misses Hollerith on a variety of legal subjects, including preparation of wills, settlement of the estate of Charles Hollerith, lingering questions regarding the estate of Herman Hollerith, and property in Montgomery County, Maryland to be used by the Metropolitan Transit Authority. Many documents are bills for legal services rendered. Organized chronologically.

Folder 64: General correspondence, 1946-1984. Includes letters written to unspecified "Miss Hollerith," the Misses Hollerith in general, or carbon copies of letters sent to other recipients. A documents are copies of letters written by the Misses Hollerith. Subjects include distribution of the estate of Herman Hollerith, authorization to make stock transactions, advice on trees and living accommodations, the National Cathedral School, and other financial matters.

Folder 65: Employee records, 1947-1983. Contains notebooks and handwritten notes recording dates worked by Hollerith employees and compensation owed, correspondence from and relating to former employees, carbon copies of letters written by the Misses Hollerith relating to employee matters, and an assortment of government forms covering employer's contribution reports, tax returns, and wage reports. Small book labeled "Memorandum" has a few pages relating to employee wages, although first page records dues paid for the "Afternoon Sketch Club," with Lucia Hollerith heading the list. Small black volume includes payments made for non-wage transactions, but as entries primarily relate to wages, it is filed with employee records. Generally organized chronologically, although notebooks are located at the beginning of the folder.

Folder 66: Employee record book, 1956-1961. Ledger divided into sections by name of employee, then chronologically records wages paid, carfare allotted, and taxes and wage deductions. Holiday bonuses paid to employees for 1959 and 1960 listed on page 26. Nan Hollerith also left assorted notes throughout the volume as they related to particular employees. Pages 2-25 were left by Mrs. Lucia Hollerith regarding her Metropolitan Bank account from 1919-1928. Employee ledger begins on page 26.

SERIES VIII: REAL ESTATE RECORDS, 1913-1985

Folder 67: Construction of 1617 29th Street, NW, April 30, 1915. Bills and vouchers for work completed on Hollerith residence as of April 30, 1915. Includes bills for materials used and payroll records of the George A. Fuller Company, the contractor in charge of building the Hollerith residence. The documents were compiled and sent to Frederick B. Pyle, architect of the Hollerith residence. These documents were in turn sent to Hollerith's lawyer, George M. Metcalf, and sealed until the 1990s.

Folder 68: Construction of 1617 29th Street, NW, May 28, 1915.

Folder 69: Construction of 1617 29th Street, NW, July 6, 1915.

Folder 70: Construction of 1617 29th Street, NW, August 27, 1915.

Folder 71: 1617 29th Street, NW, 1925-1939. File contains receipts for products installed in and work completed on the Hollerith family home in Georgetown. Correspondence with manufacturers and contractors detail the home's physical infrastructure and appliances, as well as how the Holleriths furnished, decorated, repaired, and utilized space in their home. Documents also remark on gardens around the house, maintenance performed by landscapers, and products bought from garden supply companies. Materials in this and following files are organized chronologically.

Folder 72: 1617 29th Street, NW, 1940-1949.

Folder 73: 1617 29th Street, NW, 1950-1959. Item of particular note in this file is a copy of a 1959 complaint filed by the Misses Hollerith against J. Francis Harris for pulling down a tree, which damaged trees on the Holleriths' property when it fell.

Folder 74: 1617 29th Street, NW, 1960-1969.

Container 5

Folder 75: 1617 29th Street, NW, 1970-1979. In addition to similar records to previous folders, this file contains inventories of rugs cleaned by Security Storage Company, a letter from Nan Hollerith to the Department of Highways and Traffic requesting white lines be painted on 29th Street to prohibit cars from obstructing driveway entrances, and correspondence in 1979 between attorneys for the Holleriths and Mark Keshishian & Sons, Inc., regarding the apparent theft of one of the Holleriths' oriental rugs. Documents provided in the case of the missing rug include inventories and appraisements of the oriental rugs in the Hollerith home.

Folder 76: 1617 29th Street, NW, 1980-1985, and undated material. File includes copy of a real property assessment appeal, and correspondence with attorney John Bixler regarding assessments of 29th Street property. Letter of John Bixler, dating November 20, 1984, also went to Mrs. Aubrey Gasque, Myrtle Beach, SC; Mr. Charles Hollerith, Jr., New York, NY; Mr. Herman Hollerith, III, Alexandria, Va.; Mr. Richard Hollerith, Jr., Montville, NJ; Mrs. Gillet Lefferts, Jr., Darien, Conn.; Mrs. H. Erich Nietsch, Upper Monclair, NJ.

Folder 77: 1633 29th Street, NW, 1930-1984. The house on Mackall Square bearing the address of 1633 29th Street was located on property owned by the Holleriths. The house at 1617 29th Street was located in a corner of this larger property, and the Hollerith family rented Mackall House to tenants. The Thomas Bradley family were long-standing residents of Mackall House. This file contains bills for repairs made to the house and property, as well as account statements generated by Phillips and Canby, Inc. [later Phillips, Canby & Fuller, Inc.], the real estate company which managed the property. As Phillips and Canby also managed other properties for the Holleriths and combined account statements with those for other sites, researchers should also consult Folders 77-79 and 81-83 for statements relevant to the Mackall Square property. In addition to standard records, items of interest include a 1934 solicitation for information about Mackall House to include in the Historic American Buildings Survey undertaken as part of the Civil Works Administration, and

inquiries as to possible sale of Mackall House to interested parties. Documents in file arranged chronologically.

Folder 78: 1617 and 1633 29th Street, NW, preservation easement records, 1983. In 1983, the Misses Hollerith decided to convert their Georgetown properties at 1617 and 1633 29th Street, NW into an historic preservation easement to be deeded to the Foundation for the Preservation of Historic Georgetown. Folders contain documents, arranged chronologically, relating to the process of establishing an historic preservation easement. Materials in this file include sample and actual deeds, summaries as to taxation issues and valuation of the property, letters from the Holleriths' attorney John Bixler, surveys and descriptions of the property, list of Hollerith heirs, and correspondence from Bixler to the Internal Revenue Service. The easement process was delayed by the terms of Herman Hollerith's will, which complicated establishing ownership rights to the property, and this file contains copies of the will and documents filed with the Probate Division of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia to reopen Herman Hollerith's estate and name an administratrix. The October 26, 1983 letter from John Bixler was also sent to Mrs. George Case, Charles Hollerith, Jr., Herman Hollerith III, Richard Hollerith, Jr., Mrs. Gillet Lefferts, Jr., Mrs. H. Erich Nietsch. The original September 1983 blueprint prepared by Greenhorne & O'Mara is located in an oversize file, and a reduced photocopy can be found in this folder.

Folder 79: 1617 and 1633 29th Street, NW, preservation easement records, 1984-1985. File includes letters written to members of the Hollerith family by attorney John Bixler concerning progress of the easement, copies of documents filed with the Probate Division of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia, drafts of deeds of Scenic, Open Space, and Architectural Facade Easement, consent forms for reopening the Estate of Herman Hollerith signed by Hollerith's heirs, appointment of Virginia Hollerith as administratrix of her father's estate, and an Inventory of Money and Debts and Account for Hollerith estate. All materials arranged chronologically.

Folder 80: 1617 and 1633 29th Street, NW, preservation easement records, bound reports, 1976, 1984. Folder contains two bound appraisals of Hollerith property on Mackall Hill with regard to easements. One appraisal was completed in 1976 by Col. Robert F. Evans for Real Property Analysts, Inc. Colonel Evans' report highlights the market value, describes the structures on the property, includes maps showing locations of the houses and lots, and photographs of the houses located on the property. In photographs of gardens of Hollerith home, Nannie and Virginia Hollerith are visible in the foreground. The second appraisal, also produced for Real Property Analysts, Inc., was prepared in 1984 by Anthony and Judith Reynolds of Reynolds & Reynolds, Inc. This appraisal also describes the location and value of the homes and property. Pre-easement value was estimated based on comparison of similar properties, which are also examined extensively in the report. Likewise, the Reynolds report contains updated, but less extensive, photographs of the Hollerith property.

Folder 81: 1618 29th Street, NW, 1918-1964. The Holleriths owned the property across the street from their family home for rental purposes. This file contains bills for and correspondence regarding repairs and services performed at the property and charged to the Holleriths. The realty firm of Phillips and Canby, Inc. [later Phillips, Canby, & Fuller, Inc], managed this property for the Holleriths, and corresponded frequently with them on matters concerning the rental house and

provided them with account statements. Copies of letters from the Holleriths to Phillips and Canby are also included. As Phillips and Canby also managed other properties for the Holleriths, statements of account often included items relevant to other rentals. Phillips and Canby materials are filed by either the first property listed, or when applicable, the property with the most items charged to the account. Researchers should also consult Folders 73 and 81-83 for other relevant statements. By 1964, J. F. Begg, Inc., Realtors had assumed management of the property. All documents relevant to 1618 29th Street are organized chronologically.

Folder 82: 1618 29th Street, NW, 1966-1972. File contains same type of materials as previous folder. Items of interest include copies of leases issued for rental and signed by members of the Hollerith family, plans drawn for repair of the veranda and bathroom renovations, and a proposal to for installation of a residential elevator, and an appraisal of the property based on comparable locations.

Folder 83: 1618 29th Street, NW, 1973-1985, and undated material. In addition to bills for repairs, and correspondence from Begg, Inc., are solicitations from assorted realtors asking to purchase the property on behalf of clients, and exhibits introduced in support of real estate appraisal. By 1980, Begg, Inc. began to produce computerized “owners statements” summarizing accounts.

Folder 84: 3018 44th Place, NW, 1932-1946. The Holleriths initial connection to the Wesley Heights property was in assuming the mortgage from the owner, their attorney Christopher B. Garnett, who found himself unable to make the payments. Correspondence from Garnett to Mrs. Hollerith during the years 1932-35 relates to this arrangement, and his payment on the loan. The deed to the property was transferred to Mrs. Hollerith in 1939. Documents from 1939-43 are primarily bills for repairs sent to real estate management company Phillips & Canby, which maintained the house as a rental property for the Holleriths. The file also contains a few carbon copy letters written by Mrs. Hollerith to parties interested in purchasing the property, and correspondence between Mrs. Hollerith and Medford P. Canby. Documents are arranged chronologically.

Folder 85: 1743 Connecticut Avenue, NW, 1930-1940. Similar to the Wesley Heights property, the Holleriths extended a loan to Mrs. Rebecca Hyde Wellington and her daughter Rebecca Granville Wellington for a second deed of trust on the property. The property was of mixed use; containing both a store and residential dwellings. In 1934, Mrs. Hollerith became the owner of the property through foreclosure, and the Wellingtons remained residents in the building as renters. Documents in this file include correspondence from Christopher Garnett to the Holleriths, the Wellingtons, and H. L. Rust outlining the terms of the loan; letters from the Wellingtons to Mrs. Hollerith, correspondence between H. L. Rust and Mrs. Hollerith, and Phillips & Canby and Mrs. Hollerith; account summaries relating to the property; and other documents and bills regarding Mrs. Hollerith's ownership of the property. A few account summaries provided by Phillips & Canby also detail accounts for Hollerith properties at 3018 44th Place and 1618 29th Street, but are filed with records relating to 1743 Connecticut Avenue as the summaries focus more attention on the latter property. All materials organized chronologically.

Folder 86: 1743 Connecticut Avenue, NW, 1941-1943. Documents include bills sent to Phillips & Canby for repairs and services performed at property; account summaries; and carbon copies of letters from Mrs. Hollerith to Phillips & Canby. Items of interest include a 1943 plate glass insurance policy with Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company which excludes responsibility for payment in the event of an “enemy attack” during World War II.

Folder 87: 1743 Connecticut Avenue, NW, 1944-1949, and undated. Documents include bills sent to Phillips & Canby for repairs and services performed at property; account summaries; and many undated letters from Rebecca Wellington to Mrs. Hollerith. The contents of Rebecca Wellington’s letters are a mixture of personal information and business matters relating to the Connecticut Avenue property. A few account summaries provided by Phillips & Canby also detail accounts for Hollerith property at 1618 29th Street, but are filed with records relating to 1743 Connecticut Avenue as the summaries focus more attention on the latter property. After Mrs. Hollerith’s death in 1944, account summaries are addressed to the Estate of Lucia B. Hollerith.

Folder 88: Rockville, Maryland property, 1929-1937. Mrs. Hollerith acquired through foreclosure the property known as Villa Roma on Rockville Pike in Rockville, Maryland. Villa Roma was operated as a nightclub. Documents in this file include correspondence from Hollerith attorney Christopher B. Garnett with Mrs. Hollerith, Albert Bouic, Taylor McDaniel, and Frank Abbo regarding the property and Abbo’s debt thereon; Taylor McDaniel’s reports on caretaking of the property. Mrs. Hollerith sold the property to Frank Davis in 1936. Materials arranged chronologically.

Folder 89: Mobjack Farm, Mathews Co., Va., 1913-1963. This file contains records relating to the operation of Mobjack Farm, and the residential property called “Brighton.” Documents include statements for goods and services purchased for and repairs made on the estate; valuations on buildings on property for insurance purposes; handwritten notes on farm products; correspondence with agricultural extension services; and correspondence from the Misses Hollerith to nearby businesses. Leonard Minter seems to have performed caretaker services as he submitted consolidated reports for labor and materials needed for repairs. A 1952 letter from Charles Hollerith of Lake State Products Inc. relates to a Wash-A-Matic dishwasher.

Folder 90: Mobjack Farm, Mathews Co., Va., 1964-1979. Folder contains correspondence from the Misses Hollerith to local businesses and contractors; bills for goods purchased and services rendered; 1965 U.S. Annual Information Return; insurance reports of audit; transactions with the Richmond Livestock Company, Southern States Grain Marketing Cooperative, and Tappahannock Livestock Market; and information regarding pier project undertaken by adjoining property owner.

Folder 91: Mobjack Farm, Mathews Co., Va., 1980-1985, undated material, and livestock pedigree charts. Contains bills for goods purchased and services rendered; transactions with agricultural and livestock companies; memorandum from attorney John Bixler regarding the possible sale of part of property to a nephew; wetlands permit for construction of rip rap revetment; Lucia B. Lefferts memorandum to Virginia Hollerith proposing “Brighton Corporation” to keep property in the family; legal correspondence regarding possible deed of easement; and undated materials. End of

file contains pedigree charts and herd lists for livestock at Mobjack Farm dating from 1935 to 1963 (when the farm ceased operation), and alphabetical outline of livestock.

Folder 92: Mobjack Farm account book, Mathews Co., Va., 1981-1985. Ledger detailing expenses incurred at Virginia estate. Accounting only occupies pages 9-43; first several pages have been removed, while rest of the ledger is blank. Account book formerly belonged to Lucia Hollerith, director of the Burnside School of Art. Addresses, likely written by Lucia Hollerith, are listed on page 150.

Folder 93: Other real estate records, 1936-1981. Documents include correspondence regarding a lot at 1411 31st Street; inquiry about renting garage on 29th Street; and possible donation of land at New Point, Virginia for memorial park and recreation center. Many of the documents in this file relate to oil leases in Texas the Misses Hollerith inherited from their uncle, Harry R. Talcott. Materials include a petition by Nan Hollerith for appointment as administratrix in the Talcott estate, Texas state and county tax receipts, Rock Island Oil & Refining Co., Inc., Division Orders, and assorted correspondence regarding the Holleriths' interest in the Harriet Owens and Grimshaw leases. In 1972, Herbert Salzman inquired about buying Hollerith property in Georgetown, and a set of documents relate to his proposal to buy and improve the land. The Holleriths did not approve of Salzman's additions and the sale was not completed, but legal correspondence documents the process. Materials roughly organized chronologically, although Texas and Salzman documents have been kept together and overlap in dates.

Folder 94: Real estate tax and government bills, 1923-1984. File contains real estate tax bills levied against Hollerith properties in Washington, D. C. and Virginia. Tax bills from the 1920s and 1930s addressed to William Reynolds, but in the Holleriths' possession. District of Columbia real estate taxes are first in the file, followed by U.S. Information Returns, state and local levies for Mathews County, Virginia, and receipts for ground rent issued by the Commission of Fisheries, Commonwealth of Virginia. Organized chronologically within type of documents.

Folder 95: Utility bills, 1942-1983. File contains samples of utility bills paid by the Holleriths in Washington, D.C. and Virginia, and occasionally correspondence from the Misses Hollerith to their service providers. The reverse side of some bills, particularly from the earlier period, feature advertisements for local radio programs, and World War II rationing and war bonds information. Utility providers are: Potomac Electric Power Company (PEPCO), Washington Gas Light Company, Virginia East Coast Utilities, Inc. (which became East Coast Electric Company), Virginia Electric and Power Company (VEPCO), the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company, The C & P Telephone Company, East Coast Telephones, and Tidewater Telephone Company. Documents are organized by service company (in the order listed above), and therein chronologically by date of bill. Due to the repetitive nature of the bills, only representative samples of each have been retained. Utility bills for rental properties owned by the Holleriths can be found in files dedicated to those properties. PEPCO bills issued during 1943-1946 are notable primarily for the advertising messages

on the reverse. Most advertise station WTOP's "Home Service Daily" with Elinor Lee, and "The Electric Hour" with Nelson Eddy, sponsored in the Washington area by PEPCO. Other bills encourage customers to ration power during World War II.

Folder 125: Extended family papers, 1928-1979. Contains correspondence directed to other members of the Hollerith family, but likely forwarded to the Misses Hollerith for their information. A few letters are carbon copies of letters written by the Misses Hollerith to other Holleriths, primarily brothers Richard and Charles. Receipt from 1928 relates to a stock transaction by Herman Hollerith Jr. Topics are almost exclusively of a financial nature, and several relate to oyster planting grounds in Virginia. Other items include an undated Christmas card addressed to "Mr. H. R. T." [Harry R. Talcott, Lucia Talcott Hollerith's brother] from "A. F.," and a program from 1944

commencement exercises at the Lawrenceville School in New Jersey which notes Richard Hollerith, Jr. as among the graduates.

Folder 126: Hollerith-related correspondence, 1916-1941. Contains documents not written to or from the Holleriths, and which did not logically fit with other topics contained in the collection. A letter from Dr. Finney discusses Mrs. Hollerith's health, another seeks appointments for Charles and Herman Hollerith, Jr. in the Naval Service, and the last two address botanical subjects Documents arranged chronologically.

Folder 127: Other papers, 1920s-1970s, and undated. Consists of items not identifiable by recipient or otherwise associated with other parts of the collection. Items of interest include a War Ration Book stub, change of address for Phillips & Fuller, brochure for Ford's Theater, invitations to exhibits, and assorted handwritten notes for painting done on unidentified building, real estate prices in the Georgetown area, list of 34 items attached to note with telephone number of Anne Murray at the Smithsonian, and index to photographs not contained in Hollerith collection.

Folder 128: Account books, 1892-1897; gift notebooks, 1902-1931; memorandum book, 1911. 3 vols. Owner of the black account book not identified, but may have belonged to Harry Talcott while in California. Small account book engraved with "Compliments of The California Powder Works, No. 230 California Street, San Francisco, Cal." Owner of burgundy leather notebook not definitively identified, but judging by family members included on gift list (both Lucia Holleriths and names of all Hollerith children appear), volume may have belonged to Herman Hollerith. Lists recipients of gifts, identified items given, and price paid for items each Christmas. Christmas lists are generally recorded chronologically, although lists for 1910s appear before 1900s. End of volume lists checks written from 1922-31. Memorandum book only contains identifiable date of 1911, although it may also cover other dates. Contents include notes for meetings, addresses, and lists of items in or needed for boats Matoaka and Luvina (named for Hollerith daughters), and measurements for furniture in buildings on Mathews County farm. Owner of this volume not identified, but may have belonged to Herman Hollerith

Folder 129: Religious volumes, ca. 1912, ca. 1929, and undated. 3 vols. Contains *Brief Notes for Meditation, Adapted to the Seasons. Taken from the Writings of Mrs. G. J. Romanes.* [ca. 1912], Book of Common Prayer [ca. 1929], and a miniature New Testament bible.

Folder 130: Address books, ca. 1945-1946, 1950-1956, 1957-1965. not dated. 3 vols. Owners of address books not identified. Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company book printed for 1945-1946; small black and plaid volumes suggest dates of ownership by tally of Christmas cards kept in front.

Folder 131: Address books, undated. 3 vols. Owners of address books not identified. Volume with gold bow contains addresses for various member of the Talcott family. Reptile-skin bound volume contains the addresses of Charles, Herman Jr., and Richard Hollerith, Mrs. T. E. Hambleton (Mrs. Lucia Hollerith's mother), and various members of the Talcott family.

Folder 132: Account book, undated. Ledger records financial transaction with various individuals and businesses. The volume is not identified by year, nor is the owner of the ledger. Similarities in handwriting suggest it may have belonged to Herman Hollerith.

Folder 133: Photographs. Includes photographs of homes in Georgetown and Mathews County, Virginia, and members of the Hollerith family. Some photographs have captions on the back of the print to identify subject, but others are unidentified. A few prints are labeled with dates from the 1940s, but most are undated.
