Finding aids are narrative guides to archival collections created by the repository to describe the contents of the material. They often provide much more detailed information than can be found in individual catalog records. Contents of finding aids often include short biographies or histories, processing notes, information about the size, scope, and material types included in the collection, guidance on how to navigate the collection, and an index to box and folder contents.

Nathan Smith Lincoln (1828-1898) was born in Massachusetts on April 3, 1828, the son of Increase Sumner Lincoln and Eliza Smith Lincoln. He moved to Washington, DC in the 1850's and established a medical practice, becoming prominent in the city's medical community. During the Civil War, he served as the surgeon-in-chief of the army hospital in Washington, DC. After the war, he continued his practice and was a professor of surgery at Columbian University. Lincoln was a physician to President James Garfield and attended him at the time of his assassination. He married Jeanie Thomas Gould in Troy, NY in 1877 and had two children, George and Natalie. Lincoln died on October 14, 1898.

Jeanie Gould Lincoln (1842-1921) was born Jeanie Thomas Gould in Connecticut on May 28, 1842. The Gould family was prominent in the town of Litchfield and in the legal community of the state. The family included among its ancestors David Thomas, Jeanie Lincoln's great-grandfather and a Congressman from New York at the beginning of the 19th century. Jeanie was a well-known writer of novels concerning the social scene in Washington, DC at the end of the 19th century and was reviewed in newspapers across the United States. She was also a friend of the American actor Richard Mansfield and the collection contains several of his letters. Jeanie Lincoln died on August 8, 1921.

Natalie Sumner Lincoln (1881-1935), born October 4, 1881, was the daughter of Nathan and Jeanie Lincoln and lived in Washington, DC all her life. She was a popular mystery novelist in the 1910s, 20s, and 30s. Her work included several novels, as well as short stories; published in mystery and detective magazines. She also served as the editor of the *Daughter of the American Revolution Magazine* during the 1920s. Natalie Lincoln died on August 8, 1935.

George Gould Lincoln (1880-1974), born July 26, 1880, was the son of Nathan and Jeanie Lincoln and lived in Washington, DC all his life. He was a graduate of Sidwell Friends School and Yale University. George Lincoln was a longtime correspondent for the *Washington Star* newspaper, covering presidential activities; his career spanned the administration of Theodore Roosevelt to the Nixon Administration. He also wrote a regular column for the *Star*. Gould was a Republican and friend of Richard Nixon and a correspondent of Spiro Agnew. He was also a close friend of Lyndon B. Johnson. Gould was married twice: first to Mary Hester Shepard (d. after 1926), with whom he had two children, a son and a daughter, Nathan Shepard Lincoln and Marjorie Gould Lincoln. His second wife was Elizabeth Wilder, who he married in 1946. He died on December 2, 1974.

Marjorie “Peggy” Gould Lincoln (1918-2000), born May 12, 1918, was the daughter of George Gould Lincoln and Mary Hester Shepard Lincoln. She was a lifelong resident of Washington D.C. She attended Potomac and Madeira Schools, served in the WAVES during World War II, and graduated from Barnard College. She worked with the National Archives and the Interior Department, and then in the 1950’s began working on Capital Hill in the Senate offices of Republicans Hugh Scott, H. Alexander Smith, and Clifford P. Case. When Case was not reelected in 1978, Marjorie Lincoln began working for the International Red Cross until retiring in 1983. She remained active in volunteer organizations such as Meals on Wheels, Georgetown Ministry Center, and Cooperative Urban Ministry Center, and Grace Episcopal Church. She died on December 29, 2000.

Scope and Content: The Nathan Smith Lincoln Family Papers, 1717-2000 (1850-1974), consists of genealogy information, personal correspondence, business correspondence, legal documents, and ephemera of the Lincoln family. The collection includes papers relating to Dr. Nathan Smith’s medical practice in Washington, DC, the literary careers of Jeanie and Natalie Lincoln, the newspaper career of George Gould Lincoln, and the life of Marjorie Lincoln. The collection includes a substantial number of papers relating to the family of Jeanie Gould Lincoln, including David Thomas, a member of Congress at the beginning of the 19th century. The correspondence of George Gould Lincoln contains several letters from prominent government officials from the 1930s to the 1970s, including Lyndon B. Johnson, Richard Nixon, and Spiro Agnew.

The collection is arranged in generational order, beginning with family genealogies, arranged alphabetically, and then continuing with Dr. Nathan Smith Lincoln, his wife Jeanie Gould Lincoln, and their children, Natalie and George Gould Lincoln. It ends with Marjorie Lincoln, the daughter of George Gould and Mary Hester Lincoln. The papers are arranged according to document type (e.g. correspondence, literary works, etc.) and then chronologically within the document types. Oversize material and photographs are housed at the end of the collection. An Appendix of family art and artifacts is included.

FAMILY HISTORY AND GENEALOGY

Cabot

Folder 1: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Cabot family histories and genealogies, correspondences between family members, and notes of the Mars ton, Dwight, Flint, and Partridge family lines.

Chase

Folder 2: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Chase family histories and genealogies in both America and England, copies of the family Bible records, copies of correspondence, and an explanation of the Chase family motto and crest.

Chestney

Folder 3: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Chestney family line histories and genealogies. It includes information about Dr. James Chestney and his imprisonment during the Civil War. He was released based on a recommendation from Dr. Nathan Smith Lincoln and President Abraham Lincoln. This folder contains a photocopy of the letter written by President Lincoln to the Secretary of the Interior.

Dudley

Folder 4: Biography/Genealogy. Consist of Dudley family histories and genealogies, along with notes on the Goodwin, Sabin, Rogers, and Martson families, and Major Edward Carlisle Boynton.

Gould

Folder 5: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Gould family histories and genealogies, family correspondence, legal documents, obituaries of several family member, and information about the family's history in the town of Litchfield, Connecticut. See also oversized folder for legal information concerning David Thomas and George Gould's admission to the Bar.

Hall

Folder 6: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Hall family histories and genealogies and notes on the Prescott family.

Lincoln-Smith

Folder 7: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of both Lincoln and Smith family histories and genealogies, along with Lane, Holmes, Fearing, Miller, and Paige family notes. It includes literary works mentioning early members and lines of the family (esp. Seth Lincoln, Jr.), correspondence about family life, several obituaries, and information about the family's history of medical practice. See also oversized folder for ephemera and military documents concerning Sumner Lincoln.

Newbold

Folder 8: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of genealogy of the Newbold family, family correspondence, and legal documents belonging to Thomas and Clementine Gould Newbold.

Shepard

Folder 9: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Shepard family genealogy and notes.

Thomas and Turner

Folder 10: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Thomas and Turner family histories and genealogies.

Torrey

Folder 11: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Torrey family histories and genealogies, family correspondence, legal documents, and obituaries, especially pertaining to Dr. Erastus Torrey and Ellen Torrey.

Vail

Folder 12: Biography/Genealogy. Consists of Vail family histories and genealogies, records from the family Bible, and legal documents of pertaining to George Vail.

Correspondence

Folder 14: Career and personal correspondence, 1850-1898. Includes letters relating to his Civil War duties in Washington DC, correspondence from his family, and a photocopy of what Dr. Lincoln called his 'famous telegram,' which pertained to Jeanie Lincoln's miraculous health recovery, 1876.

Folder 15: Career correspondence, 1881-1882. Includes a letter signed by Lucretia Garfield and news clippings related to Garfield's treatment by Dr. Lincoln.

Ephemera

Folder 16: Dartmouth College ephemera, 1850-1898. Includes commencement and reunion programs and newsletters containing Dr. Nathan Smith Lincoln's obituary notice.

Folder 17: Medical practice ephemera, undated. Includes prescriptions and news clippings.

Folder 18: Invitations and programs, 1877-1898. Includes a copy of Dr. Nathan Smith Lincoln and Jeanie Gould's wedding invitation and an invitation to the funeral of General Sheridan.

Folder 21: Career and personal correspondence, 1890-1919. Includes a letters to the editor, letters with friends and family, and correspondence related to her literary works.

Folder 22: Richard Mansfield correspondence, 1880s-1910s. Include letters between Richard Mansfield and Jeanie Lincoln, a theater program, and a news clipping about his son's death.

Folder 23: Literary works, undated. Poetry.

Folder 24: Literary works, undated. Includes a complete manuscript of Jeanie Gould Lincoln's play *An Unwilling Maid* and several partial plays.

Folder 25: Literary works, undated. Includes a complete manuscript of Jeanie Gould Lincoln's play *For Lesbia* (prelude-scene IV).

Folder 26: Literary works, undated. Includes handwritten copies of articles, books, and short stories.

Folder 27: Literary works, undated. Includes a complete manuscript of Jeanie Gould Lincoln's book *In the Lap of Chance* (Chapters 1-10).

Folder 28: Literary works, undated. Includes a complete manuscript of Jeanie Gould Lincoln's book *In the Lap of Chance* (Chapters 11-24) and a short story titled *The Mushroom Vendor*.

Folder 29: Literary works, 1900s. Includes published articles by Jeanie Gould Lincoln titled *The Experience of an Applicant* and *Historic Homes of Litchfield*.

Folder 30: Literary works, 1880s-1890s. Includes handwritten notes by Jeanie Gould Lincoln pertaining to social events such as gift lists, menus, and seating charts.

Folder 31: Career newspaper clippings, 1890s-1910. Includes book reviews, author sketches, and advertisement related to her literary career.

Folder 32: Personal newspaper clippings, undated. Includes news clippings about Jeanie Gould Lincoln, friends and family, social columns, and a letter to the editor.

Ephemera

Folder 33: Ephemera, 1860s-1920s. Includes programs, menus, and invitations. Items of highlight are a ticket to the United States Senate gallery, a carriage check stub from the White House, a ticket to be admitted into the gallery during President Andrew Johnson's impeachment trial, invitations to the funeral ceremonies of President James Garfield and President Chester Arthur, and numerous invitations to events at the White House.

Folder 34: Personal legal documents, 1830s-1910s. Includes legal information pertaining to Jeanie Gould Lincoln about George and Sarah Gould (parents) and financial information such as loan, estate, and tax receipts, 1830s-1908.

Folder 35: Career legal documents, 1888-1911, Includes a certificate admitting one of Jeanie Gould Lincoln's books into the Library of Congress and numerous contracts with the Houghton Mifflin Company for book publications.

Folder 39: Career correspondence, 1930s. Includes correspondence with her publishers and readers.

Folder 40: Career correspondence, 1910s-1930s, Includes Natalie Lincoln's work as editor of the *Daughters of the American Revolution Magazine*.

Folder 41: Personal correspondence, 1910s-1930s. Includes correspondence from her cousin Charles Gould, letters relating to her discovery of a valuable stamp, and a letter soliciting Natalie Lincoln's help in selling handkerchiefs, from Ernest Bawen, an inmate at Montana State Prison.

Folder 42: Literary work, undated. Includes manuscripts of Natalie Lincoln's short stories.

Folder 43: Literary work, undated. Includes an edited manuscript of Natalie Lincoln's book *Whoso Diggeth A Pit?* (chapters 1-11).

Folder 44: Literary work, undated. Includes the complete manuscript for Natalie Lincoln's play *Scarlet Quill* and a cast sheet.

Folder 45: Literary work, undated. Includes a physician's notebook which Natalie Lincoln used to down epitaphs of interest, miscellaneous notes, and as a daily planner.

Graphic Material

Folder 46: Graphic Material, 1920s-1930s, Includes book covers and advertisements relating to her publications. See also oversized folder for advertisements.

Organizational Material

Folder 47: The National Service School material, 1910s. Includes programs, certificates, and postcards related to the National Service School.

Folder 48: The Vigilantes material, 1918. Includes informational publications by The Vigilantes. Natalie Sumner Lincoln was a member of and a contributing writer for the organization. The organization was created by authors to try and break what they saw as America's apathy and unpreparedness through the use of propaganda literature.

Folder 49: League of American Pen Women material, 1922. Includes a publication, which contains an article by Natalie Sumner Lincoln and a speech given by Natalie Lincoln to the organization.

Folder 50: National Society of Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America material, 1920s. Includes Natalie Lincoln's application, acceptance certificate, and a yearbook.

Folder 51: National Society of Colonial Dames of America Organizational Material, 1920s-1930s. Includes a membership list, the constitution and by-laws, and an event invitation.

Newspaper Clippings

Folder 52: Career newspaper clippings, 1910s-1920s. Includes articles and stories written by Natalie Sumner Lincoln.

Folder 53: Career newspaper clippings, 1910s-1920s. Includes primarily reviews and articles about Natalie Sumner Lincoln and her writings. It also contains a scrapbook filled with newspaper reviews and book covers.

Folder 54: Personal newspaper clippings, 1910s-1930s. Includes a scrapbook filled with social columns of interest to Natalie Lincoln.

Folder 55: National Service School newspaper clippings, 1916. Includes information about participants, daily schedules, and classes. Natalie Sumner Lincoln attended in 1916.

Folder 56: Daughters of the American Revolution Newspaper Clippings, 1920s-1930s. Contains news clippings about the organization and Natalie Lincoln's work as the editor of DAR magazine.

Ephemera

Folder 57: Ephemera, 1900s-1930s. Includes invitations, programs, and various other memorabilia such as ticket stubs. Items of highlight are invitations and calling cards from the White House, a certificate of completion from the American Red Cross, and membership cards.

Legal Documents

Folder 58: Legal Documents, 1935, publication contracts and a listing of items received by Gould Lincoln in his sister's will.

Folder 59: Biography/Genealogy, 1974. Includes a handwritten biography by son, Nathan Lincoln, obituaries, and the *Congressional Record* containing George Gould Lincoln's obituary.

Folder 60: Biography/Genealogy, 1974. Includes George Gould Lincoln's memorial book, list of funeral attendees, flower cards, and memorial cards.

Folder 61: Biography/Genealogy, Mary Hester Shepard Lincoln, 1910s-1920s. Includes a wedding invitation, marriage announcement, and driver's license.

Folder 62: Biography/Genealogy, Elizabeth Wilder Lincoln, 1970s. Obituary of George Gould Lincoln's second wife.

Folder 63: Biography/Genealogy, Nathan Shepard Lincoln, 1910s-1990s. Includes literary works by Nathan Lincoln such as poems and biographical information about George Gould Lincoln, and a certificate of appreciation for service in the Armed Forces.

Folder 64: Biography/Genealogy, educational papers, 1880s-1910s. Includes a report card, a program from the dramatic club in which George Gould was a member, a class day program from Yale, and a history of Sidwell Friend's School written by George Gould Lincoln.

Correspondence

Folder 65: Personal Correspondence, 1920s-1930s. Includes correspondence with his wife while covering the campaign trail of 1924 and condolence notes about Mary Hester Lincoln's death in 1926

Folder 66: Career and Personal Correspondence, 1940s-1950s. Includes letters from various government officials, friends and family, and letters in reference to George Gould Lincoln's newspaper columns.

Folder 67: Career and Personal Correspondence, 1960s-1970s. Includes letter with Lyndon B. Johnson, Richard Nixon, and Spiro Agnew, along with correspondence about presidential library interviews, letters pertaining to his columns, and friends and family.

Literary Works

Folder 68: Speeches, 1930s-1970s. Includes speeches given to various groups, such as the Gridiron Club, Sidwell School, Sigma Delta Chi, and many other civic organizations.

Folder 69: News articles, 1950s-1970s? Includes news articles in drafts and completed manuscripts written by George Gould Lincoln for the *Washington Star* in 'hold for release' form.

Folder 70: Transcripts and related ephemera, 1960s. Includes the transcripts from a radio broadcast with George Gould Lincoln was a guest, titled *Report to the People of Pennsylvania*; the National Press Club program honoring the retirement of George Gould Lincoln and three of his colleagues; telegrams sent in regard to the occasion; and the Nation Press Club's luncheon meeting honoring George Gould Lincoln.

Folder 71: Oral history interviews, 1960s-1970s. Includes the transcripts of George Gould Lincoln's oral history interviews for the Hoover, Truman, Kennedy, and Lyndon B. Johnson presidential Libraries.

Newspaper Clippings

Folder 72: Career newspaper clippings, 1930s-1974. Includes newspaper articles about George Gould Lincoln career such as assignments, awards and honors received, and various social events in which he participated.

Folder 73: Career newspaper clippings, 1930s-1970s. Includes newspaper article written by George Gould Lincoln. Most of these are from the *Washington Star*, where he had an editorial column, but there are examples of some of his article being published in newspapers throughout the United States.

Folder 74: Gridiron newspaper clippings, 1930s. Includes newspaper articles about the Gridiron Club, which George Gould Lincoln was a member.

Folder 79: Biographical/Genealogy, WAVES, 1945. Includes information about Marjorie Lincoln's service in WAVES, her Honorable Discharge from the Navy, notice of receiving the Good Conduct Medal, and an alumni letter from the National Service School.

Folder 80: Personal correspondence, 1940s-1970s. Includes letters from friends, family, and colleagues. Primarily letters of condolence upon her father's death in 1974.

Folder 81: Correspondence, 1970s-1980s. Includes correspondence with various historical societies about contributions.

Organizational Material

Folder 82: Organizational material, 1980s-1990s, Includes material related to community organizations where Marjorie Lincoln volunteered such as certificates of appreciation, notes of thanks, and organizational information/newsletters, such as Meals on Wheels, Georgetown Ministry Center, and Urban Ministry Center.

Folder 83: Personal newspaper clippings, 1930s-1940s. Includes article about social events in which Marjorie Gould Lincoln participated.

Folder 84: Ephemera, 1953. Includes an invitation from Eisenhower's Inaugural Committee to attend and participate in the inauguration of President Eisenhower and Vice-President Nixon.

Folder 85: Genealogy. Includes photographs of historical family members and family information. Contains photographs of individuals such as David Thomas and Sarah Vail and the family crest.

Folder 87: Jeanie Gould Lincoln, 1870s-1921. Includes a photograph of Richard Mansfield's son. See oversized box for photograph of Jeanie Gould Lincoln with family at Mt. Vernon.
